And both provide opportunities.¹

With over 60% of its population involved in Agriculture and though African Agriculture is said to present a number of opportunities, the African Development Review of 2017 presents numerous challenges to Agricultural development among which technological innovation, land reforms, irrigation, climate change, trade, value chains and gender gap in resources access. These² are key issues as they shape agricultural productivity as well as the inclusiveness and sustainability of Africa's agricultural transformation. One of the major challenges of Agriculture in Africa is the use of rudimentary agriculture practices.
