Go Green Campaign in its third edition brought the youth to the front as a driving force to work on the Cooperatives and SDG#13 (Climate Action). It brought the cooperative community together with Youth to work on the environment, by proving the cooperative business is a sustainable model and helps the community to grow while caring for its environment.

GO GREEN CAMPAIGN

The Go Green Campaign is an initiative of International Cooperative Alliance Asia and Pacific Committee for Youth Cooperation (ICYC), started in 2018, to encourage youth from the Asia-Pacific to combat the global threat of climate change and its impacts, by planting trees on International Mother Earth Day. Based on the belief and cooperative value of 'Self-Help and Solidarity', the campaign manifests that youth and cooperatives can be a part of something greater while sustaining their environment. Through this campaign, ICYC wants to promote the idea that cooperatives are sustainable and responsible in their approach and play an important role in protecting the planet.

The idea of GGC was created by Mr. Ahsan Ali Thakur, Chairperson of ICYC to highlight that the environment is changing, and the scale of cutting down of trees for development of a city, country, and region, needs to be reduced. The objective of this campaign is to gather the youth from different countries from Asia -Pacific, America, and Africa to plant trees through self help and solidarity.

Therefore, planting of trees is the ideal step that can be taken through the Cooperative Societies to [#fightclimatechange](#).

The Go Green campaign is now in its third year and builds on previous initiatives carried out in 2018 and in 2019, the campaign was expanded to include youth from Africa and generated very enthusiastic participation. Read the 2018 Go Green campaign report [here](#).

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF COOPERATIVES



This year the theme for International Day of Cooperatives was Sustainable Development Goal (SDG13) Climate Action. This event focused on the contribution of cooperatives to combating climate change, one of the most severe challenges during the 21st century. Climate change severely affects people's livelihoods around the world, especially the most disadvantaged groups such as small-scale farmers, women, youth, indigenous peoples, and ethnic minorities, who have to cope with extreme natural disasters and

degradation of natural resources.

The cooperative movement can use this opportunity to take a stand as a global actor of change and collaborate with its partners within the international community. This collective effort can significantly affect the climate agenda and achieve a fair, green and just transition for all communities, leaving no one behind.

We hope to achieve this by promoting the values of Sustainable Development Goal #13 (Climate Action) Solidarity and Self-Help that are the core values in the campaign and out of numerous cooperatives. We believe that it is with these values and our responsible actions, that we can make our environment sustainable and healthy for the future generations.

By having active support of the young generation and cooperatives, we hope to make this thought a true reality.

HOW TO BE A PART OF THE GO GREEN CAMPAIGN 3.0

There are 2 ways that cooperative organization and institute with youth, can be a part of Go Green Campaign 3.0 (2020) and working on Sustainable Development Goal number 13 - Climate Action (SDG#13), considering the Novel Coronavirus (Covid19) which are as follows:-

Physical Activity: By Planting saplings of trees and flowers, taking a picture or video with our banner provided in the toolkit and sending it to ICYC. Virtual Activity: The purpose of the international webinar on Go Green Campaign was to create awareness about the climate action and how youth are engaged in decreasing carbon emissions through cooperatives. The committee invited **Ms. Ruth Legg** who works as the Manager, HSBC Bank Canada and also serves on the board of Modo, a British Columbia car-sharing cooperative serving over 20,000 members, whose business contributes directly to reducing climate change; **Ms. Yohana Tamara Yunisa** from Indonesia, who leads the agriculture project on Cocoa Conversation; and **Ms. Emma Patterson** who leads Climate Change and Sustainability at SAOS, Agriculture Cooperative from Scotland. The session was moderated by Mr. Robby Tulus, Cooperative Activist from Canada.

Countries from Asia and Pacific Region:

Plantation Drive (Physical Activity)

Indonesia

Keling Kumang Credit Union with INKUR in the city of Sintang planted sapling in which 25 cacao trees and 5 bananas were planted. Ms. Yohana Tamara Yunisa with 8 youths led the planting of the saplings. Youth are informed about the Cooperative and how cooperative works. They wanted to increase the agroforestry method to decrease deforestation and maximize the production. The banner was made of fabric and it was re-used for potting of new seedlings and saplings for future plantations.



Kopindo is a federation of cooperatives under Pendi Yousuf (Chairperson) in the event joined by Raliansen Saragih (Vice President of DEKOPIN), collaborated with NGO and Community. The Forestry and Environmental Observer Council of the Sundanese Tatars (DPKLTS), Indonesia Cooperative Council (DEKOPIN). 20 participants were taking part in this campaign. Planting about 300 saplings (bamboo, palm Arenga pinnata palm sugar and typical coffee) in the area of Lembang. Including one of the ICYC members Mr. M. Risal. They were able to participate from two different cities.



Nepal:

Nepal Agriculture Cooperative Central Federation Ltd (NACCFL) is an agriculture cooperative based in Kathmandu. This year with General Manager, Mr. Rudra Bhattarai and Deputy General Manager, Ms. Meena Pokhrel. 19 members / cooperators participated in the campaign, out of 19, 15 were youth cooperators having knowledge about the cooperative movement. Approximately, 20 saplings (Avocado, Dragon fruit, Strawberry, Fig) were planted in the office vicinity.



Pakistan:

Karachi Co-operative Housing Societies Union Ltd. belongs to the housing sector, with community members (Karachi and Islamabad) and Iqra University (Karachi Campus) participating in the event in various locations and cities. Mrs. Errum Sharif Bhajji (Representative of Cooperative Housing International (CHI) & KCHS Union Ltd.) planted 5 saplings, C.P. Star School and C.P. Berar High School for Girls planted 9 plants for the campaign, Ali and Burhan Hussain (Brother) members from Karachi community planted 4 saplings and 1 tree (3 date plants, 1 orange tree and 1 aloe vera). Children were encouraged to be a part of the Campaign, Ms. Bareera (6 years old) planted 2 saplings (Neem, Office time sapling).

Iqra University collaborated with KCHS UNION Ltd., Students participated by planting trees at home, in farm house and in community, Ms. Nigarish planted 3 saplings (Rose, Neem, Jasmine). Mr. Khizer Javed planted 16000 (Neem, Jaman, Gul mehar, Suchain, Gogam bail), Ms. Cheryl Parveez 5 (Mint).

In Islamabad, Ahsan Ali Thakur, planted 5 Saplings (lemongrass and Aloe vera), Atif Aziz planted 1 Sansevieria saplings, Ms. Nawal planted 1 (Periwinkle's).

In total, 16031 trees were planted for the campaign and approximately 25 people were involved to make the city green.



Sindh Graduates Cooperative Housing Society is located in Hyderabad, Sindh and is from the housing

sector and collaborated with Rotaract Club Jamshoro Optimistic (part of Rotary International District 3271). In Covid19 pandemic, youth volunteers led by Benazir Sheike, celebrated the Go Green Campaign 3.0 by planting 15 different types of saplings (Mango, Aloe vera, Red Rose & Neem). Three locations were selected, Jamshoro, Hyderabad & Mirpurkhas.



NITA Crafts Development Multi-purpose Cooperative Society Nasarpur, is an art, tile and other ceramic manufacture company. Their team led by Mr. Hyder Daudpota (Chairman of NITA) of 10 individuals and planted 10 saplings (Moringa and Neem) where trees are scarce and needs more environmental attention.



Philippines:

AIMCooP is an insurance cooperative located in Aurora, Zamboanga del Sur. They became a part of the Campaign with Local Government under the office of Municipal Mayor Hon. Atty. Boen Dorotheo R. Cabahug together with the office of the Department of Agriculture of Aurora, Zamboanga del Sur, Philippines in providing seeds to turn into seedlings as part of the strong partnership of AIMCooP and the Local Government Unit of Aurora, Zamboanga del Sur, Philippines. 100 youth participated in the event and the top management of AIMCooP also participated in it. 1000 saplings were planted by all of the various vegetable categories. They reuse their old tires as pots for planting trees in the office vicinity.



Philippines Cooperative Center (PCC) Participated in the GGC 3.0 while planting the in the office garden vicinity. A total of 9 people participated in which 3 were youth and 3 saplings were planted in the event (Guava, Moringa, and Pomelo). Edwin A. Bustillos – Chief Executive Officer and other staff were participants as well, was a participant and people were encouraged to plant trees.



Young Entrepreneurs Service Cooperative located in the City of Imus, Province of Cavite. Contributed to plant 50 Mahogany saplings and 50 participants took part. They collaborated with the City of Imus Agriculture Office, City of Imus Environment and Natural Resources Office, City of Imus Agriculture Office, Rotaract Club of Imus, and Rotary Club of Imus. Not only planting trees they arranged a webinar for local Community which any one can be a part of the webinar in Filipino Language.

How to Participate in the Go Green Campaign 3.0 (Webinar), 30th Jun 2020

An orientation webinar on GGC 3.0 was conducted on 30th Jun 2020 for everyone to join in the webinar with the purpose to identify, spread awareness and include other cooperatives that wish to participate in the event. Everyone was given a chance to clarify the event information so that it can follow the guidelines in the event. The Youth Networks and Committee representative were a part of this session. It was to

motivate and circulate the information in the event.

The speaker was Mr. Ahsan Ali Thakur from ICA AP Committee on youth Cooperation. Guests: Ms. Angélica Soberanes from ICA - America Youth Network (CRJ), Hilda OJall from ICA Africa Youth Network, Mr. Geoffrey Asira ICA Africa Office and Mr. Alireza Banaeifar from ICA - Asia and Pacific Committee on Youth Cooperation.

Approximately, 3200 viewers were reached and 392 people were engaged in the event.

- C. Consumption not only refers to the final product but to being aware of the value chains in the process.

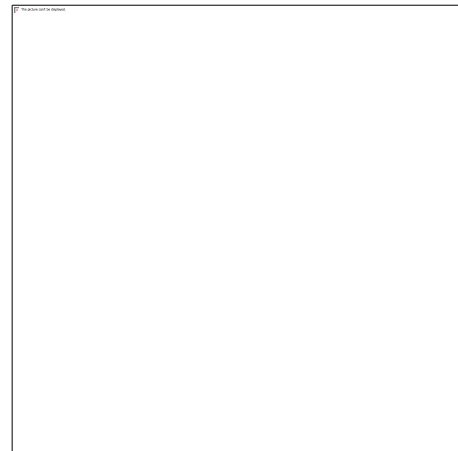

Eswatini (Swaziland)

Kenya

Led by International Cooperative Alliance-Africa Youth Network President, Hilda Ojall and Mutarakwa Harmony Cooperative Chairperson, Samuel Oloo. A number of youth convened at the Kenya Forest Service sub-station in Nairobi to commemorate this year's International Day of Cooperatives through a tree planting activity commonly dubbed as the Go Green Campaign 3.0.

ICA-Africa Youth Network conducted its subsequent awareness week (8th - 14th July) to sensitive

youth on climate action, and towards this noble course. The Kenya Forest Service Chief Conservator of Forests - Julius Kamau, supported the youth-led initiative in planting trees thus securing a space for the activity that saw 50 trees planted.

"We have planted 50 commemorative indigenous trees and we thank the CCF for facilitating our tree planting exercise at Ngong Road Forest Station. We shall further adopt the trees and ensure that they grow by regularly maintaining them." Said Samuel Oloo. The Kenya Forest Service recognized the efforts by the youth-led cooperatives for contributing to environmental conservation and equally called on Kenyans to embrace a tree growing culture towards the protection of the environment, mitigating adverse climate change, and securing the future for the present and next generations.

South Africa

The Youth Cooperative Hub Tertiary Cooperative organized for their Go Green Campaign 3.0 in South Africa that saw participation from a number of stakeholders. More focus of their activities were on inclusive green community & green cooperatives economy, contributions to climate change adaptation & mitigation and initiatives activities related to Go Green Campaign 3.0.
