<u>Abubakar Saddiq Labaran</u>, Is the current Youth President of the ICA-Africa youth network, President of Nigeria Cooperative Youth Alliance and a board member of Niger state cooperative Federation. Labaran is also serving as the president of the young farmers association of Nigeria, Niger state chapter and chairman of Niger East young farmers club. He is a graduate of Agriculture in Animal Production from Benin Republic. Labaran has speared many development initiatives ranging from youth development, communities' development and helped in establishing Cooperatives in Nigeria. He is a beneficiary of the many Cooperatives notable one being nominated by the cooperative federation of Nigeria to represent the country in training courses in Malaysia and japan.



<u>Erick Obongo</u>, is the current Sectoral Development Officer and ICA-Africa Youth Network Coordinator at the International Cooperative Alliance-Africa.
